A Pastor's Story: Your Support of the Gospel Encourages Hearts During Difficult Days

Pastor Rostislav Birobidzhan Region, Russia

This past spring, we celebrated the resurrection of Christ—a celebration of victory over death! We see the proof of the wonderful love of God in the sacrificial death and victorious resurrection of our Savior! His sacrifice was not in vain, and myriads of saved souls are the sure proof. God continues His saving work around us. As the Lord declares . . . they turn from darkness to light and from the dominion of Satan to God, that they may receive forgiveness of sins and an inheritance among those who have been sanctified by faith in Me (Acts 26:18).

Many events have taken place this year, and now our country is going through difficult times. This helps me realize how important it is now to preach the Gospel, when everything to which we are accustomed breaks down. Difficult times bring many worries and troubles, and people need not only comfort, but also to be pointed to that which is really important and unchangeable—the news about the future judgment of sin, the work of Christ and the necessity of repentance, and the hope of eternal life in Him.

In May, I started a **baptism class** and right now there are four people attending. Please continue to pray for Leonid and his friend Alexander, as well as Khazry in Khabarovsk and his wife Anna, for her salvation. **We pray daily at 4 PM for the salvation of people.** Prayer time for this is also part of our Wednesday and Sunday services.

Ivan: Surprised by Kindness

I would like to share one testimony. Once I was walking with our son not far from our home, and we encountered a man who looked like he was homeless. I saw such depression in his eyes. At first, I did not take that into account, but as I thought about it, I felt compassion and also badly that I did

not talk to him. But 10 minutes later, he once again walked past us.

This time, I approached him and began talking to him about how he could be reconciled with God. His name is Ivan and he is 47 years old. He was really surprised that I paid attention to him and talked to him kindly. Ivan had spent several years in prison, and while he was there, he heard sermons from one of our local pastors who visited the prison.

I told Ivan where I lived, prayed for him, and then we parted. A few days later, I heard someone knocking on my door and it was Ivan. He was dirty, wounded, and really tired. He asked for help to find a place to stay. He had a job and a small income, but nowhere to live. He had gotten drunk

and had been beaten and robbed. We prayed, and the Lord prompted me to take him to a private social shelter. Two weeks later, I met him in the street again. This time he was clean and well dressed. Ivan told me that all was now well with him—his documents and bank cards were found. He had a new job and was well received there. He is rejoicing that he was able to escape such an awful situation. Pray with me that this will lead to a new life in Christ for Ivan!

We continue to witness to, and disciple, people in the villages, and you can see in the photos the variety of people with whom we're working.

Dear brothers and sisters, thanks be to God for challenging you to be involved in our ministry. I thank my God in all my remembrance of you, always offering prayer with joy in my every prayer for you all, in view of your participation in the Gospel from the first day until now (Philippians 1:3-5).

This year, together with another missionary named Eduard, we went for an evangelistic trip to the Tattinsky region and a village there. The village in question is about 186 miles from Yakutsk and is Eduard's hometown. We are grateful to our God and Father and our Lord Jesus Christ. This trip had a humanitarian purpose—we went from house to house in order to take the Gospel there, and it is already yielding fruit.

This is the **fourth trip** we have made to this village. We visited many families, where we had a warm welcome and people were open to hear the Gospel. We brought food and other aid such as clothes, which we distributed to needy families. We are thankful that Stepan, the head of the village administration, has a very good opinion of Christians. Some time ago—back in the 1990s when the Soviet Union was collapsing—the doors for the Gospel were open in our country, even in heathen places like Yakutia. But Stepan was not the head of the village then.

His car broke down in the bitter winter near where believers were. Our brothers came and helped

him, taking his broken-down car to the garage and repaired it. They also provided him with dinner and hot tea. When he got up to leave, they gave Stepan children's Bibles and some other literature. He remembers this event to this day!

Even prior to his becoming head of the village, he distributed the literature he had to other villagers. Among them was Eduard, who was a small boy at that time, and he received a children's Bible in his house! Such an amazing story! Stepan stays in contact with Eduard, and the doors of the administration are always open for our brothers!

During this particular trip, a husband and wife we were visiting repented before God, and we were very glad! We pray for them to grow spiritually. The work of spreading the Gospel of the Kingdom of God is advancing throughout Yakutia, just like our Lord commanded. You will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you shall be My witnesses both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and even to the remotest part of the earth (Acts 1:8).

Christ's Love in Action Among Ukrainian Refugees

Since the war broke out in Ukraine February 24, SGA partners like you have risen to the call and made it possible for us to help the faithful churches in the former Soviet Union to respond to the great needs around them. Thousands of men, women, and children have been displaced from their homes, and our brothers and sisters are laboring diligently to

help them with their immediate needs through SGA-supported Compassion Ministry.

More than that, they are hearing the lifechanging Gospel, giving them eternal hope in the face of such devastating loss. Below are a few snapshots of how your help is making a huge difference in many lives for the glory of Christ! •



Yaroslav repented and accepted the Lord last year. He has kidney cancer and needs constant therapy. Yaroslav has not received his pension since the start of the war, February 24. Through SGA-sponsored Compassion Ministry, believers have helped provide Yaroslav with his much-needed medicine.



Lydia and her family lived under enemy occupation for five days. Due to constant shelling, the family was forced to leave their home. It took them four days to get to an unoccupied part of Ukraine. The family is very thankful for the humanitarian aid provided by believers, and is receptive to the Word of God.



Olya is a forced migrant from Kharkiv. She came with her parents, her younger sister, and her own three children. They settled in a house where no one had lived for a long time and there were no beds. The local churched helped them with beds and the family is very grateful for the help in the midst of the war.



Gennady, his wife, son, and elderly parents lived in the Kherson region. They were under occupation until June 28. The family did not have their own vehicle to eave, and there were no more evacuation buses because they were blocked by the Russian military. The family was forced to negotiate with private carriers to provide safe passage through checkpoints, which cost all of their savings. The family is very thankful for aid provided by local believers.

CIS IN THE NEWS

A Diplomat's Prediction: Prolonged Ukraine Conflict

A senior Russian diplomat recently told the Financial Times that he sees no possibility of a diplomatic solution to the war in Ukraine, and expects a long conflict. Gennady Gatilov is the Russian government's permanent representative to the UN in Geneva. He added that the UN ought to be playing a bigger role in ending the war, and accused the US and NATO of pushing Ukraine to walk away from negotiations. "We do not have any contacts with the Western delegations," Gatilov said. "On the protocol side we do not see each other . . . Privately we do not have any contacts, unfortunately . . . we simply do not talk to each other." The war broke out February 24 when Russia invaded Ukraine, and the invasion was quickly

condemned by Western countries, followed by severe economic sanctions.

We continue to pray for peace and an end to this awful war, which has shattered so many lives and has had global impact as millions of displaced refugees have sought asylum wherever they can. The faithful evangelical churches SGA serves across Ukraine, Russia, and the other former Soviet nations continue to do all they can to aid the refugees, provide for their needs, and lovingly share the Gospel as God provides opportunity. Pray with us for the ongoing resources needed to support the churches during these difficult times for their ministries. •
